Beach Working Party Update

The SCG has writen to Deputy Premer Barilaro (before he became ex-DP) about independent legal advice we have received. This stated that Council could not apply for a sand mining licence while the NSW State Geological survey held the licence over the offshore sand location. They would need to transfer the licence to Council or give up the licence so Council could apply.

SCG received a reply under the direction of the new DP, indicating that the State expected Council to lay the groundwork for a State Significant Project (for nourishment) and to take ownership of any (future) Licence application.

Council have announced that the 4 options considered to support mass sand nourishment have now been completed and that the yearly dredge top-up of sand volumes emerged as the winner. It was not stated where this dredged sand would come from or who would deliver however, the cost of this option placed it as the first option. The other 3 options (headland, offshore reef and sand pumping) now appear unfortunately discarded.

Air and Water Quality

The SCG has a member on the EPA's Newcastle Community Consultative Committee on the Environment (NCCCE) that meets quarterly and includes industry, community representatives and the EPA. This is a forum for the community to raise concerns around pollution issues be they air, water, odour or noise. You can email the SCG with any issues you would like raised by our representative at these meetings and the minutes of the meeting are available on the EPA website. This role continues to be effective in raising key issues particularly in relation to industrial pollution and incidences

Importantly any community member can raise concerns with the EPA pollution line 131555. Please do this is as the EPA relies on this information to act. They will ask you about the pollution concern, time of pollution and weather at the time.

Stockton has an air quality monitoring station that provides air quality information 24/7 and the data is included in a quarterly air quality report prepared by the EPA, discussed at the NCCCE meetings and available on the EPA website. You can access the air quality monitoring station data anytime on the EPA website or use the address below.

The air quality monitoring station (located at the far western end of Flint St) measures the following parameters:

- PM 2.5 particles smaller than 2.5 microns (the most dangerous for our health)
- PM 10 particles smaller than 10 microns
- Ammonia
- Nitrous oxides
- Sulphur oxides
- Wind direction and speed

Remember the more calls to the EPA pollution the line on any pollution issue, the higher it is ranked and leads to quicker action by the EPA.
